Board had been approached by Liberty Power in their consideration of the SE quarter of Mahaska County for use as a wind tower farm project. Board felt constituents from county should hear proposal, ask questions and give their feedback to the board for consideration in moving forward or not.

Olivia Neter, representative for Liberty Power (subsidiary of Algonquin Power & Utilities Corp), gave presentation outlining Liberty Power's interest in expanding wind farm projects across the United States including Iowa and have identified the potential in Mahaska County for one such project. In Mahaska County both wind and solar are readily available. Target area would be Spring Creek, White Oak, Harrison and Cedar townships. It would be a \$70,000,000 project - up to 300 megawatt with 60-80 turbines. Would need 1500-2000 acres. Company likes to use local labor force and local businesses through the construction process. They are only in the second week of the project, nothing has been done yet. A county ordinance and road use agreements would need to be in place. Any damage to roads etc. would be compensated. Liberty would finance the project. No eminent domain is used. Newer turbines are recyclable in comparison to earlier models that have just gone to scrap yards. She noted that if approved the company wants to work with the communities as they expect the project to sustain up to 50 years or more.

Attendees shared concerns and questions and thanked the board for holding the meeting to give opportunity to hear at an early phase before there is any commitment from the county to Liberty.

Board discussed Senate File 2285 recently signed into law by governor changing the residence requirements for supervisors appointed to city Planning & Zoning Commissions and Boards of Adjustment. This affects appointments to the current Pella Planning & Zoning Commission and Pella Board of Adjustment.

Resolution #2022-20

A RESOLUTION TO WITHDRAW FROM A 28E AGREEMENT WITH THE CITY OF PELLA AND THE CITY OF OSKALOOSA REGARDING THE JOINT ACQUISITION, CONSTRUCTION, EQUIPPING, USE, EXPANSION, AND OPERATION OF AN AIRPORT FACILITY

WHEREAS the Board of Supervisors of Mahaska County, Iowa is a party in a 28E agreement with the cities of Pella and Oskaloosa for the purpose of the joint acquisition, construction, equipping, use, expansion, and operation of an airport facility that was signed March 26, 2012 with the approval of the Board of Supervisors of Mahaska County, Iowa on March 21, 2012 by passing Resolution No. 2012-03-03, and

WHEREAS on June 19, 2017 the Board passed Resolution No. 2017-12 to amend, terminate, and withdraw from the aforementioned 28E agreement, and

WHEREAS, subsequent to that resolution Mahaska County has been in litigation with the cities of Pella and Oskaloosa over the legality of the 28E agreement, and

WHEREAS, the Iowa Supreme Court held in *Landowners v. S. Cent. Reg'l Airport Agency*, No. 20-1323, 2022 WL 2277119 (Iowa June 24, 2022) the 28E agreement violates the Iowa Constitution because it "unlawfully binds the County's board of supervisors to the decisions of an earlier-elected board regarding the exercise of governmental functions" and that the agreement "unlawfully restricts the County from terminating its delegation of powers to the SCRAA", and

WHEREAS, the Iowa Supreme Court has "declare[d] that Article XI of the 28E Agreement is invalid and sever it from the remainder of the Agreement. Mahaska County may, consistent with this opinion, choose to withdraw from the 28E Agreement by a valid vote of its board of supervisors.", and

WHEREAS, the Board's desire to withdraw from the 28E agreement with the cities of Pella and Oskaloosa has remained unchanged in the intervening five years since Resolution No. 2017-12, NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Supervisors of Mahaska County, Iowa as follows:

The Board reaffirms that Mahaska County withdraws from the 28E agreement with the cities of Pella and Oskaloosa for the purpose of the joint acquisition, construction, equipping, use, expansion, and operation of an airport facility stipulations contained therein as stated in Mahaska County Board of Supervisors Resolution No. 2012-03-03 and terminates any and all obligations and responsibilities as contained in that agreement.

This resolution shall become effective upon passage.

This Resolution shall be filed with the Secretary of State and recorded with the Mahaska County Recorder. Pursuant to Article XII, Section 5, of the 28E Agreement, notice of this Resolution and a copy thereof attached shall be sent by ordinary mail to the Chair of the Board of the SCRAA and the presiding officer of the governing body of all Parties.

PASSED, APPROVED, AND ADOPTED this 29th day of June, 2022.

Public Comments: Tim Van Maanen commented on the supreme court decision finding the 28E agreement illegal. County residents have stayed in the fight. Airport was voted down in Oskaloosa and then this 28E was created. Feels it was done illegally to circumvent the vote. This result wouldn't have happened without the three supervisors. Wants residents to know how important to have Supervisors that want clear and open legal process. This has protected residents and saved millions in future for taxpayers. Chuck Webb gave thanks to all that believed in the mission. John Bandstra thanked the board and stepped down now from his appointment on the SCRAA board. Board thanked him for his service. Supervisor Groenendyk commented that the money spent on the legal suit has been a problem for the county. This suit was filed by the cities against the county. The decision from the Supreme Court verifies that people have a right to have a voice in how their government is run.
